FATALITY MANAGEMENT MORGUE PROCESSING UNIT LEADER

RESOURCE CATEGORY	Public Health, Healthcare, and Emergency Medical Services
RESOURCE KIND	Personnel
OVERALL FUNCTION	The Fatality Management (FM) Morgue Processing Unit (MPU) Leader oversees processing teams in the morgue and provides security for human remains and records.
COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. This position can be ordered as a single resource or in conjunction with a NIMS typed unit (Fatality Management Morgue Processing Unit) 2. Discuss logistics for this position, such as security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment 3. The position typically works 12 hours per shift, is self-sustainable for 72 hours, and is deployable up to 14 days 4. Requestor specifies if hazardous materials are present in the operating area; provider ensures that individuals hold certifications required by applicable laws and regulations to operate in environments where hazardous materials are present

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.

DESCRIPTION	<p>The FM MPU Leader:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Establishes guidelines for assigning a morgue reference number (MRN), opening morgue case file folders, and instituting processing procedures, under the direction of the local Medical Examiner/Coroner (ME/C) and Mass Fatality Management Group Supervisor 2. Oversees processing teams in the morgue, while providing security for human remains and accompanying records 3. Oversees needs and procedures of the functional stations 4. Ensures completion of all forms for assigned human remains after each morgue station completes its processing 5. Submits completed morgue case folders to the Morgue Identification Center (MIC) when human remains processing is complete 6. Reports directly to the Mass Fatality Management Group Supervisor or designee 	Not Specified
